

Lessons from a Tree

Since the Winter Solstice on December 21, 2023, we have subtly been given more light. Unfortunately, it can be difficult to appreciate if you work inside all day. Compounded by the fact that holiday decorations are usually packed away by now, this time of year can make it ever more challenging on our mental health. The lessons we can learn from nature can help us get through difficult times. There is still a great deal of life this time of year that show us that short periods of rest can yield amazing bounties later on.

Deciduous trees are a great example.

Deciduous trees are our oaks, maples and other trees that lost their leaves in the fall for a few reasons. One, the leaves are what take in the sunlight and convert it into energy. Since there's less sunlight this time of year, it can actually cost them more energy to produce their leaves.

Doing what needs to be done to help conserve energy is essential.

Second, leaves are made with energy taken in and stored as sap. Sap is a combination of sugar and water that runs up and down the trees when the temperature is right. When water freezes, it expands. If this happens before the sap goes down to the roots and below the freeze line, it can split the bark of the tree, exposing it to bugs and disease.

Thirdly, if our broad-leafed trees such as our maple or oaks were to retain their leaves, and it were to snow, it would add weight to the branches that are not meant to handle the extra burden. We have seen what can happen during early snowstorms before the leaves have had a chance to shed. Branches break under the extra load, causing a great deal of damage to the tree and sometimes, surrounding trees.

I encourage anyone to take these lessons from the trees this season. Conserve your energy, rest your body before it forces you to rest from illness and take care of yourself so you can better care for those around.

Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month

Dating violence is more common than you may think, especially among teens and young adults: 1 in 3 U.S. teens will experience physical, sexual, or emotional abuse from someone they're in a relationship with before becoming adults. And nearly half (43%) of U.S. college women report experiencing violent or abusive dating behaviors. According to the CDC, teens who experience dating violence are more likely to experience symptoms of anxiety and depression, engage in unhealthy behaviors such as substance use, exhibit antisocial behaviors, and think about suicide.

Each February, young adults and their loved ones nationwide raise awareness about teen dating violence through Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month. This annual, month-long effort focuses on advocacy and education to stop dating abuse before it starts.

Sexual Assault Awareness Month

Sexual Assault Awareness Month calls attention to the fact that sexual violence is widespread and impacts every person in the community. According to Mental Health America, victims of sexual assault are at increased risk of depression, post-traumatic stress disorder, substance use disorders, eating disorders, and anxiety. SAAM aims to raise public awareness about sexual violence and educate communities on how to prevent it.

The theme of Sexual Assault Awareness Month 2024 is Building Connected Communities, a campaign that helps us reduce the likelihood of sexual abuse, assault, and harassment in our communities. We must strive to create strong, connected communities that take care of one another. Child Abuse Prevention Month

Child Abuse Prevention Month was established in 1983. It recognizes the importance of families and communities working together to prevent child abuse and neglect.

Protective factors increase the well-being of children and families, and reduce the likelihood of abuse and/or neglect. Identifying protective factors helps parents find resources, supports, or coping strategies that allow them to parent effectively. The 6 protective factors include nurturing & attachment, knowledge of parenting and of child and youth development, parental resilience, social connections, concrete supports for parents, and social and emotional competence of children. Autism Awareness Month
